

INSTRUCTIONS FOR AUTHORS

Manuscript submission

Papers must present scientific results that are essentially new.

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Submission of a manuscript implies: that the work described has not been published before (except in the form of an abstract, or as part of a published lecture, or thesis); that it is not under consideration for publication anywhere else; that its publication has been approved by all co-authors, if any, as well as by the responsible authorities - tacitly or explicitly - at the institute where the work has been carried out. The publisher will not be held legally responsible should there be any claims for compensation.

The “Copyright Transfer Statement”

It has to be signed and faxed to the publisher together with the corrected proofs with which it will be provided by the publisher shortly after the manuscript has been accepted for publication.

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- All manuscripts are subject to peer review and copy editing.
- Manuscripts must be written in good English and should be typed in single-line spacing throughout with at least 2.5 cm (1 inch) margins.
- Use a normal, plain font (e.g., Times New Roman) for text.
- Use the automatic page numbering function to number the pages.
- For indents use tab stops or other commands, not the space bar.
- Use the equation editor of your word processing program or MathType for equations.
- Abbreviations should be defined at first mention in the abstract and again in the main body of the text and used consistently thereafter.
- Try to avoid use of footnotes to the text.
- SI units should be used throughout except where non-SI units are more common [e.g. *litre (l)* for volume].

Please arrange your manuscript as follows:

Title page

Including name(s) of author(s), a concise and informative title, affiliation(s) of the author(s), e-mail address, telephone and fax numbers of the corresponding author.

Abstract

Each paper must be preceded by an abstract presenting the most important results and conclusions in no more than 250 words.

Keywords

Five keywords should be supplied after the abstract for indexing purposes.

Introduction

The introduction should state the purpose of the investigation and give a short review of the pertinent literature.

Materials and methods

This section should follow the Introduction and should provide enough information to permit repetition of the experimental work.

Results

This section should describe the outcome of the study. Data should be presented as concisely as possible, if appropriate in the form of tables or figures, although very large tables should be avoided.

Discussion

The discussion should be an interpretation of the results and their significance with reference to work by other authors.

Acknowledgements

These should be as brief as possible. Any grant that requires acknowledgement should be mentioned. The names of funding organizations should be written in full.

References

Literature citations in the text should indicate the number of citation as [1], [7-12], [9, 11, 13-17], so on.

References at the end of the paper should be listed in numerical order by the first citation.

*Journal papers: name(s) and initial(s) of all authors; full title; journal title abbreviated in accordance with international practice; year; volume number; first and last page numbers

Example:

Burlaga L.F., Fitzenreiter R., Lepping R. et al., "A Magnetic Cloud Containing Prominence Material: January 1997", J. Geophys. Res., 1998, vol.103, No.A1, pp.277-285.

If available, the Digital Object Identifier (DOI) of the cited literature should be added at the end of the reference in question.

***Single contributions in a book:**

name(s) and initial(s) of all authors; title of article; editor(s); title of book; edition; volume number; publisher; place of publication; year; page numbers

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Example:

R.Schwenn, E. Marsch, "Physics of the Inner Heliosphere: 1.Large-scale Phenomena", Springer-Verlag, Berlin, 1990.

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Tables must be numbered consecutively with arabic numerals and submitted separately from the text. They should have a heading explaining any abbreviation used in that table.

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Figure legends must be brief, self-sufficient explanations of the illustrations. The legends should be placed at the end of the text. Submit all figures as separate files and do not integrate them within the text.

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
